Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 8th August 2021

'Lord, I have had enough!' These are the words of Elijah in our First Reading today. Elijah was chosen and given the task of being a prophet and pointing out the correct way people - especially rulers - should live. He was so aware of how he was the last faithful prophet left and that his responsibility was enormous and almost impossible. God intervenes through his angel and gives Elijah the nourishment he needs to keep him going on his journey to Horeb, God's mountain. There he would be given an amazing experience of God and discover anew his role.

Do you ever feel like that? Have you prayed in that way? What was the response you experienced? Life can at times be so challenging. Most of us have found this in the time of pandemic as we listen to guidelines and regulations, find they have changed, adjust our approach and then have to alter things even more! Perhaps some of you have had a chance to go away - even abroad? Maybe others are waiting, and still waiting, for the situation to be more stable and the opportunity to go away knowing that you will not have to worry about adjusting plans at the last moment.

As we gather for Mass in church or virtually, the Father puts us in touch with a form of nourishment which is heavenly and enduring. We receive an experience of love in all its fullness radiating from the Cross of Jesus Christ and are sustained by the taste of eternity in the Eucharist. Whatever weighs us down or distorts our vision cannot be compared with the Sacrifice of total giving on Calvary which directs us on life's journey. In our Gospel passage from St. John, the Lord speaks of himself as the 'living bread come down from heaven'; this bread is his 'flesh, for the life of the world.' As Jesus utters these words, what must have been going through his mind and heart? He offers himself. He gives life. His flesh is food. God's Son chooses to

feed us with food sourced in heaven; he yearns for us to join him through the strength of this nourishment. There is nothing he wants to come in the way of our arriving at our destiny of eternal life and that is why he carried the Cross for us and with us.

As the summer unfolds, stay safe and feel the Lord's presence. Relax and be renewed. Allow the wonder of the Eucharist to be that beacon guiding you every step of the way. Fr. Tony and I continue to pray for you. Please keep us in your prayers. God bless you. With much love, *Fr. Norbert*

CATHOLIC BISHOPS' CONFERENCE OF ENGLAND AND WALES

Statement from the Catholic Bishops of England

Sunday – it is our Day

On 19th July, the current legislative powers which assist the mitigations against the covid-19 virus transmission will be rescinded by HM Government. Nevertheless, there will be an encouragement to personal and corporate responsibility in this area; as the Prime Minister said in his most recent statement "The pandemic is not over." Even without this legislation in place, the Church in England and Wales will be adopting a cautious approach to capacity and activity within our buildings, especially at corporate acts of worship.

We are mindful of the certain fact that the Covid-19 virus is still circulating in society. Vaccines provide genuine protection against the worst effects of the virus, yet we recognise the legitimate fear on the part of some who otherwise desire to gather for Holy Mass. It is our continuing judgement, therefore, that it is not possible at the present time for all of the faithful to attend Mass on a Sunday thus fulfilling their duty to God.

It is hoped that it will be possible for all Catholics in England and Wales to fulfil this most important Church precept, that of the Sunday Obligation, by the First Sunday in Advent 2021.

In the meantime, all Catholics are asked to do their best to participate in the celebration of the weekly Sunday Mass and to reflect deeply on the centrality of Sunday worship in the life of the Church.

In April, following our Plenary Assembly, we offered a reflection on the experience of the extraordinary long months of the pandemic. It was titled *The Day of the Lord*. We also began to look at the way forward. We spoke about the important invitation to restore the Sunday Mass to its rightful centrality in our lives. We asked for a rekindling in our hearts of a yearning for the Real Presence of the Lord in the Eucharist, as our response to the total, sacrificial love that Jesus has for us. We said: "The Eucharist should be the cause of our deepest joy, our highest manner of

offering thanks to God and for seeking his mercy and love. We need to make it the foundation stone of our lives." May this continue to be our striving during these coming months as we journey back to the full celebration of our Sunday Mass and our renewed observance of *The Day of the Lord*.

SYNODAL PROCESS The next Synod of Bishops will be in 2023. The Holy Father calls the entire Catholic Church to embark on a 'Synodal Path', in which he seeks not only to refresh the mission of the Church but to do so in a way which expresses the Synodal nature of the Church. The timescale for this process requires an initiative this autumn. It is a summons to a process in which every Parish will reflect together on what we have learnt from the pandemic, how it has changed us, how to renew sacramental life and how to renew our sense of mission and purpose. The Holy Father's call is that all the faithful who have shared in this time of crisis will make important contributions to the revitalising of our 'communion, participation and mission' - the key themes in the title of this Synodal invitation. This is just to keep you in the picture. We will find ways to have our own discussion and reflection here in Welwyn Garden City.

The Synodal Process Introduction

The title of the 2023 Synod of Bishops is "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission." For the first time, the Synod Office in Rome has produced a comprehensive process which encompasses the stated aim of the Holy Father that the Church in today's world should have a vision of missionary communion orientated to evangelisation.1 The process begins in the Particular (or Local) Church and then moves to the level of the Bishops' Conference. From there, discernment takes place in the Regional Area – for England and Wales, it would be steered by the European Council of Bishops' Conferences (CCEE) – before moving to the Universal Church with the final Synod Gathering of Bishops in 2023, sub et cum Petro.

Origins

The process reflects the teaching of the Second Vatican Council in the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, *Lumen Gentium*. In this Council Document, the universality of the People of God is affirmed (LG§12) and by their anointing in the Holy Spirit, the universal body is "incapable of being at fault in belief." A presupposition for this important statement is a formation of the people in a lived experience of faith, foreshadowed in the Old Testament especially in the Exodus, from which the life of the Gospel is lived by those united to Christ in his new covenant (LG§9). The sacrament of Baptism offers entry into the life of faith and love. The Eucharistic liturgy is the pre-eminent place that the Christian community gathers to celebrate this faith and love. So, the People of God celebrate this life of faith and

love in the context of the Scriptures and the Eucharist. Thereby their faith in the Word of God and in the Tradition of the Church, through the Scriptures and the teaching office of the Church, is affirmed and nurtured. Faith is nourished through the hearing of the Word and the sharing of the Body of the Lord. Through these actions, the members of the Church enter into communion with him and all each other.

The importance of the Bishop

From this universal people, the bishops are chosen and consecrated and have an attention to the whole flock but, in particular, to the Church to which they have been appointed (LG§23). Their ministry is one of "pastors, masters of teaching, priests of sacred worship, ministers of government." Theirs is the charism of discernment as they are the "authentic guardians, interpreters and witnesses to the faith of the whole Church."2 Therefore, the bishops have a key role in listening to the people of God in their particular Church, and under the power of the Holy Spirit, to hear and discern what is being said of that Church. "In virtue of this catholicity, each part contributes its own gifts to other parts and to the entire church, so the whole and each of the parts are strengthened by the common sharing of all things and by the common effort to achieve fullness in unity." (LG §13). Each local Church is a fundamental part of the Universal Church, so what happens in each local Church contributes to the whole. It is the first link in the communion of faith shared with the other churches and cemented in the unity of the local Church around the bishop. The diversity of the local Churches and their context brings different gifts to the whole, which contribute to it. This is key to understanding this synodal pathway.

All-Many-One

The synod process is one of "journeying together" towards Christ, the *Way, the Truth and the Life* who calls his people into a unity of purpose and mutual listening between people and pastors. This journeying arrives at the Synod of Bishops gathering itself, which is presided over by the Bishop of Rome, who is called to speak as "pastor and teacher of all Christians" as the supreme witness to the *fides totius Ecclesiae*.3 The bishops are linked to the Bishop of Rome through the bond of episcopal communion and at the same time, are subject to him as head of the College of Bishops. The process therefore can be considered as an exercise of listening *all-many-one*; that is, the voice of the people of God in the particular church (all), must be heard, listened to and discerned by their

bishops as the authentic pastors (many), who then gather with the Successor of Peter (one) who acts as a point of unity for the Universal Church. The ultimate discernment is for the Pope who will offer a Post Synodal Apostolic Exhortation based on what is presented to him throughout the process of mutual listening, in which the fruits of this discernment are published in a manner that reflects the

life of the Church as always changing within its own context in the world, yet ever faithful to that which it has received.

Questions and Answers

1. What does "Synodality" mean?

Synodality comes from a Greek word meaning the "walking together" (syn-) on a "particular way" (-hodos) The "particular way" has been defined by the Synod of Bishops in its process for the Synod 2023. This can be seen in the infographic attached to this document.

2. If the process is already defined, how do we "walk together?"

Every member of the Church has the right to speak, and the obligation to allow those charged with the work of discernment the freedom to do so. Pope Francis in his book *Let us Dream* says "we need a respectful, mutual listening, free of ideology and predetermined agendas" 4 This is at the heart of the process. Each diocese will form its own means of running this listening process so that it reaches as broad a scope of people as possible.

3. *Is this just for parishes and dioceses?*

No, it involves everyone. Schools, young people, hospital chaplaincies, university chaplaincies, prison chaplaincies, the religious and consecrated communities, the societies of apostolic life, those with a distinctive charism in the church all have a voice that speaks into the conversation. Catholic organisations and charities also have a role to play in this work. Echoing the experience of the Second Vatican Council, Ecumenical and Interreligious

engagement is also encouraged, and this is best facilitated at the local level. This is an important voice from outside the Church that offers an insight into the collaboration for the good of all.

4. Can we talk about any topic?

Pope Francis says "what is under discussion at synodal gatherings are not the traditional truths of Christian doctrine. The Synod is concerned mainly with how teaching can be lived and applied in the changing contexts of our time." 5 Therefore all topics can be raised but it is important to realise that not all will form part of the ongoing discussion.
